VICAR'S INTRODUCTION

There is a time for everything under heaven and a season for each activity. So Ecclesiastes chapter 3, verse 1 begins before musing on the passing of time and experience of life through an evocative series of paired opposites:

a time to be born and a time to die... a time to weep and a time to laugh... a time to mourn and a time to dance... a time to be silent and a time to speak...

...and so on. You've heard it before, I suspect.

Now, I'm pretty sure that the poet (whoever he or she – but almost certainly he – was; the commentators call him Qohelet, meaning preacher or speaker) didn't intend this when he mused on life and meditated about the passing of time, but his words above are really quite apt when it comes to (of all things) a church Annual Report.

First, this is that time in the church's year when we gather up the stories, activities and decisions from the previous calendar year and then we put them out there in the collected form of the report that you are now holding (and reading). Whilst the liturgical calendar tells we have now entered the season of Lent, the administrative calendar reminds us that it is time for something else:

a time to produce accounts

and a time to audit...

a time to gather reports

and a time to compile them...

- a time to sign up to the Electoral Roll and a time to assemble the membership...
- a time appoint the wardens and a time to elect the PCC...
- a time to remember all that has been * and a time to say thank you.

[*well, as much as one can; it's just possible that something might get forgotten!]

But second, whatever stories we gather and reports we produce, whoever we appoint as wardens and elect as PCC, the point of it all is not limited to a well-produced and carefully formatted report, easy to read and pleasing on the eye, anymore than the poetry of Qoheleth might be said to find its purpose in looking good on a page and sounding nice when read aloud. Just as the words from Ecclesiastes invite us to ponder the significant things of our very existence – all that might come to pass between our birth and our death – so in a similar way, the familiar rhythm of the administrative life of the parish – the Meeting of Parishioners and the Annual Parochial Church Meeting - invites us to move from the superficial surface admin to a deeper spiritual reflection.

So as you read on (as I am confident you will), please keep in mind the four purposes of our Mission Action Plan:

- spiritual growth through active involvement
- faith in action that makes a difference to others
- investing in God's plans for St Barnabas
- enabling the church's mission and ministry

And as you read through, think prayerfully about your own part in what you are reading – what you get out of it, what you can give to it, how you see God at work here and where you might seek Christ afresh in the year that lies ahead. After all, there is a time for the vicar to ask you to think about that; and there's a time for you to think about how you will respond.

NIGHT SHELTER

It's hard to believe that it has only been 3 years since we opened the Wandsworth circuit. Our records show that on the first Thursday night in 2016 we had 16 guests, all men. This season, we have regularly seen 35 guests, including 5 vulnerable women. As a consequence, the night-shelter has physically expanded from the Claris Hall to two 1st floor rooms, under the stairs and (on one night when we were enacting our severe weather provision) ON the stairs itself!

Since opening, close to 2000 bed-spaces have been provided in St Barnabas alone and considerably, more than 2000 meals. And what meals! Ask a Wandsworth Guest about the circuits food and it won't be long before the words "chicken and roast potatoes" comes up. And that's a pretty poor description for the high-quality meals churned out by the kitchen team, week after week with an ever evolving soup recipe and a surprise for desert.

The new kitchen has transformed the night-shelter. 90+ fresh plates of food are, each week, produced, processed and cleared away in less than 3 hours. For a professional kitchen this would be impressive; for amateurs, it's close to miraculous. I don't know what the refit cost but you may rest assured it was money well spent! Meanwhile, thanks to generous donations from our supporters, we have increased the Wandsworth casework team from 1 to 2. Bugoslaw and Patricia have had their most successful season ever in terms of housing people.

We have seen a 169% rise in rough sleepers in the last ten years. Economic and political uncertainty and radical changes to the welfare systems mean that this terrible statistic is unlikely to change anytime soon. It is thanks to the hard-work and cheery dedication of communities like the parish of St Barnabas that Glassdoor is able to continue its vital work, helping the most vulnerable in society.

BATTERSEA WELCOME REFUGEES

St Barnabas Church is proud to be an active member of Battersea Welcomes Refugees (BWR).

BWR was formed two years ago with a vision to proactively help families who have been displaced as a result of the Syrian crisis. Made up of likeminded volunteers from seven of the eleven Anglican churches from across Battersea Deanery, the group was keen to act positively in response to a desperate humanitarian situation.

Working in line with the Home Office initiated Vulnerable Persons' Relocation Scheme, BWR focus has been finding landlords, equipping properties and welcoming families. We work in partnership with Wandsworth Council and, in particular, with the Family Recovery Project.

BWR has helped enable the families to adjust and settle into life in a new country. We have a dedicated lead volunteer in regular contact with each family. We have so far hosted two very successful parties for the families: a Welcome Tea and a Christmas Party. This year we are working to increase the amount of English tuition available and hope to help find opportunities for work experience as well.

To date, BWR is delighted to have successfully welcomed three Syrian families to Battersea.

This has been very well received and led to some great conversations.

FINANCE Investing in God's plans for St Barnabas

FINANCE REPORT

Last year, thanks to the continuing generosity of the congregation, St Barnabas was able to fund an exceptional spend on a complete overhaul of the kitchen.

On behalf of the whole PCC I'd like to say a huge thank you and convey our gratitude to everyone who has kindly donated to help support our work and MAP vision. Together with the increased lettings income this has enabled us to share so much of God's love to others in our 120th anniversary year, and with your ongoing support and involvement, we'll continue to extend a warm welcome to all who join us in the years to come.

So much of what we do would not be possible without your financial giving and it's so encouraging to see so many of you reciprocating God's abundant love for each one of us with your regular pledged donations, which helps us continue our life transforming work here at St Barnabas.

Our total income for all funds is £185,409.00 with outgoings at £184,639.00, so overall good use of our resources considering all we have achieved in 2018.

The Battersea Welcomes Refugees fund has £10,536.00 and we are holding a designated grant of £5,000 for our future Youth Minister (to be appointed in 2019).

An extra thank you for our Gift Aid donors as we claimed £13,500.00 in tax rebate from HMRC; tax-payers please sign a form if you haven't as yet.

Our invested reserves remain with CCLA at £55,000. 5% of unrestricted donations received goes to Mission Giving and this year we will in turn donate £3370.00 to other causes, which is an increase from £3100.00. Glassdoor, Care for the Family, International Justice Mission, Battersea Welcomes Refugees and Battersea Deanery Schools each received £620.00 in 2018. FABRICS

2018 was another busy year for the fabrics team. It saw us finally address the kitchen and thereby enabled us to better support the work of Glassdoor, which provides accommodation and wonderful meals for c.30-40 homeless guests one night a week between November and April.

All this needed funding, of course. Our new industrial kitchen cost an eye-watering £38k, but with your support, with the help of the Fundraising team running fantastic events throughout the year, and a small grant from the Allchurches Trust, we managed to raise necessary funds needed. We now have a kitchen that will last us for the next 20 years and not only make it better for our Sunday and midweek needs as a church, but keeps us compliant with Health &Safety regulations and improves our facilities for all who use the premises here.

2018 also witnessed our new quinquennial survey. This is the 5-year survey that assesses the state of the church and highlights any urgent repairs. Over the next year we need to carry out further surveys on the stonework – particularly around the tower and fix some slipped slates on the roof as well as replacing some guttering, but otherwise the report didn't bring up anything too dramatic away from general maintenance.

But we have additional plans afoot: over the next 5 years, we would like to redo the toilets and address the 125 year old door in the front porch. We also need to relay the front car park making access easier in wet conditions.

But generally, we just need to continue to adapt this wonderful old workhorse of a building into serving the needs of you, our congregation, of our homeless guests who stay with us and anonymous support groups who rely on us, and of all the groups that are pleased to run their operations here.

PASTORAL OFFICES

In 2018, there were 11 baptisms, 3 weddings and 5 funerals. There was 1 confirmation and 4 children were admitted to Holy Communion on Easter Day.

PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

The PCC trustees share responsibility for promoting the whole mission of the Church, its financial accountability, safeguarding users, the maintenance, preservation and insurance of the fabric of the Grade II listed building. They met 9 times in 2018.

ELECTORAL ROLL

The last six yearly revision of the electoral roll was in 2013. As at Dec 2018, the roll had 145 members.

BATTERSEA DEANERY SYNOD

The Battersea Deanery Synod met three times in 2018: *February* (St George's School) allowed the headteachers of St George's and Christchurch to explain how a Christian ethos shaped their schools. *June* (St Mark's) involved pioneer minister in the Arts, Rev Betsy Blatchey, describing something of her work in *Musicals, Mission and Mayhem.* And *November* (St Barnabas) was a gathering up of reports from the year just gone. Meetings are more often than not open meetings meaning any interested non Synod members can attend on an one-off basis too.

SAFEGUARDING

St Barnabas adheres to the Diocesan guidance *A Safe Church* when it comes to protecting vulnerable groups within the church environment. Using the Diocesan Annual Safeguarding Review, the Vicar, churchwardens and parish safeguarding officers (Sarita Rampat and Sandrine Simmons) systematically check procedures and then the PCC as a whole re-affirms its commitment to safeguarding children, vulnerable adults and those at risk of domestic abuse.

Measures include carrying out DBS checks on groups' leaders, pastoral team member and ensuring hirers agree to observe the church's safeguarding policies. Policies of our practice and for responding to concerns and can be found on the Safeguarding notice board in the Claris Hall and copies of the manual are available for reference at the back of the worship area, in the office, and online from our website and the Diocesan website.
